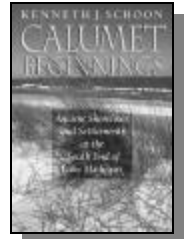

**"Discover the Reading Trail,"** our **2004 Youth Summer Reading Program** continues! Sign-up through July 24. Valid library card required to sign-up.


