GOOD NEIGHBOR DAY PARADE MAY 4, 2019

This year the parade, held annually on the first Saturday in May, happens to fall on May 4th, so, of course, the chosen theme is "MAY THE FOURTH BE WITH YOU"! With "Star Wars" as a theme, it was a little hard for the Historical Society to come up with a float idea.

We asked for someone to lend us a vintage car to drive in the parade instead. We are very pleased to say that Tim and Carol Dionne came forward to share with us their beautiful 1929 Ford. We then seized on the chance to alter the theme slightly to say "MAY THE FORD BE WITH YOU"!

We played up Lansing's history with Henry Ford building his historic hangar here to further his vision of the public accepting air travel as wholeheartedly as they had accepted his automobiles.

LANSING'S FALLEN HEROES



On April 8th, "Fallen Heroes Day", the LHS museum continued its tradition of honoring Officer Ken Novak, LCPL

Phillip Martini, Ronald L. Beuster, and Nurse Pam Wilkening, all from Lansing. Each year, Barb Dust and her volunteers set up a display for these fallen heroes. On April 8, 1992, Officer Kenneth Novak became the only Lansing Officer to be killed on duty.

He was just 27 years old. April 8, 2006, LCPL Phil Martini became Lansing's only marine to be killed in Iraq. He was only 25 years old. Ronald L. Beuster, a Marine Corporal, was the first Lansing soldier to be killed in Viet Nam. Ronald was a helicopter gunner and mechanic. He died in a helicopter crash on February 4, 1966 at the age of 24.

On July 13, 1966, Pam Wilkening who graduated from T.F. South, was one of 8 student nurses that were murdered in a South Chicago townhouse where the nurses lived. She was only 20 years old.

Our display features photographs and memorabilia of these four heroes, showing them as real young people who went to school, lived, and played here in town. We wanted to show how they lived and not just how they died. We also wanted to show how the village remembers them. We again had a great many visitors on April 8th. Sections of the exhibit will remain part of a permanent display. The exhibit will be on display until the end of April.



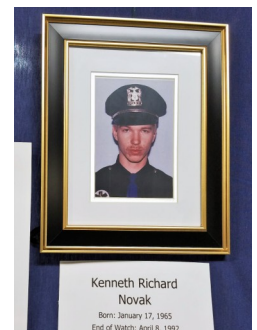

MARTIN KRAEGEL

Martin Kraegel, whose father was a long time teacher at Trinity Lutheran School here in Lansing,, was a manager at American Steel Foundry. Martin, Herb Krumm, and many other Lansing residents were also employed there.

Martin Kraegel was born in 1917 in the village of Oak Glen In 1936. He was valedictorian of Thornton Fractional High School. Upon graduation, he became an engineering co-op at ASF. As a co-op student, he alternated semesters of study at Illinois Institute of Technology with semesters of work at the Hammond Plant. Upon his graduation from IIT, he was appointed Assistant Works Engineer at the Hammond Plant with responsibilities of planning, procurement, installation, and maintenance of buildings and equipment. He was also in charge of the Tool and Die Dept.

In 1950 he received the unusual recognition of being one of a few young men selected from throughout the nation given a "Sloan Fellowship". This postgraduate study was done at the Massachusetts Institute of Technology. There he earned his M.S. in Business and Engineering Administration. Upon his return to the plant, he was promoted to Assistant Works Manager. In 1953, he was promoted to Works Manager. In 1965 he was made Assistant Vice President in charge of Manufacturing for ASF. A few years later, he was promoted to Vice President and as Vice President, he directed and coordinated all ASF Plants and the ASF Manufacturing Laboratories.

He was very active in civic and community affairs. He was President of the Munster School Board for 12 years, Director of the Hammond Chamber of Commerce, Director of the Lake County Hospital Development Corporation, member of the Munster Community Hospital Board, member of the Town Plan Commission, and a member of the Purdue Calumet Advisory Board.

Upon his retirement from ASF in 1974, he became Deputy Supt. Of the Bloomfield Hills Michigan School District. He was there for seven years, and then retired to Fort Wayne, IN where he became involved in an organization whose members are retired executives offering free assistance to small business owners.

Martin, after living an active full life, passed away at the age of 92 on March 11, 2010.

Shirley was a member of the LHS, a life member of the Munster Historical Society, South Suburban Genealogy Society and retired after 26 years as Deputy Clerk Treasurer of the Town of Munster. 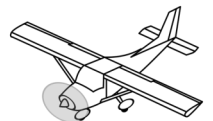

WOMEN'S HISTORY MONTH

The month of March was designated, "Women's History Month". At the Lansing Historical Museum, the month was spent doing research and gathering stories that will help us mark the accomplishments of women in Lansing and beyond.

Because Lansing has a history of being at the forefront of early aviation, we used the stories of two pioneering women aviators to set the tone for our exhibit. Charmayne Biddings researched Amelia Earhart and Bessie Coleman and found that both women had ties to the Chicago Southland. Amelia Earhart definitely once piloted a Ford Tri-Motor and possibly even landed once at our airport. Charmayne then engineered a beautiful display honoring these women, while Barb Dust set out gathering the stories of women who ran businesses at a time when women rarely got credit under their own names.

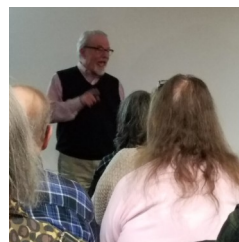
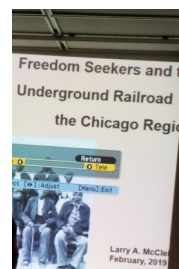
